



Percentage of Total Population





AZ Foreign Born by Region of Birth














Percent Latino By CountyCensus 2020









Turnout rates are defined as percent of voting age citizens who reported voting



Variation in <u>all three variables</u> explains voter turnout trends and variance






Citizen Voting-Age Population Turnout Rates by Education



 - Swing states




TURNOUT VARIATION: STATE POLICIES

- All states implement voting and election laws differently
 - Registration deadlines prior to election day
 - Length of residency at current address
 - Identification requirements
 - Early and absentee voting rules
 - Variable vote locations
 - Ballot method: mail only, paper ballot, kiosk, language minority coverage





Citizen Voting-Age Population Turnout Rates by Race and Ethnicity




Latino Participation in Presidential Elections, 1988-2012

Each block represents 1 million eligible voters





THE IMPACT OF LATINO VOTERS ON AZ POLITICS: A LOOK AT 2016

- 30.7 % Latino
- 47.2% of Latinos meet basic eligibility requirements in AZ
- 40.5% of Latinos are registered to vote
 - BUT... Make up only 20.85 of registered voters in AZ
- 83% of Latinos reg. to vote report actually voting!
- 19.6% of all voters in AZ 2016 were Latino
 - Exit polls: 12% of Latinos vote for Trump
 - 16.5% of AZ electorate were Latino voters for Dem. Cand.
 - 2.4% of AZ electorate were Latino voters for Rep. Cand.
 - Difference in vote shares for the candidates was 3.4% or 91, 234 votes








Arizona Hispanic Elected Officials (HEOs) 2001-2019









Number of non-White House and Senate members by race/ethnicity









% of Hispanic registered voters saying each is "very important" to their vote in 2016 ...




For Latinos, Economy and Education More Important Than Immigration

WHY THE ECONOMY: WORKFORCE CONCERNS

- fastest-growing segment of the U.S. workforce
- Are projected to make up one- third of the total U.S. workforce by 2050
- overrepresented in low-wage occupations (building services, food est., agriculture, home health care)
- experienced largest increase in fatal work injuries in 2013, a 9% jump from 2012
- aren't likely to have access to any form of paid leave or workplace flexibility

WHY THE ECONOMY: EARNINGS

- Latinas biggest wage gap: 55 cents for every dollar paid to White man
- 67% of Latinos report they are not earning enough to meet basic expenses
- 15.7% of Latinos live in poverty (2020)
- 42% of all Latinos earn poverty-level wages despite highest rate of labor force participation among all R/E groups
- Poverty rates for elderly Latinos more than twice total U.S. elder population



WHY THE ECONOMY: BANKING

- •25.6% of all U.S. households are either unbanked or under-banked v. 43% of Latino households (FDIC)
 - Outside of mainstream markets leaves Latinos vulnerable predatory products, ie pay day loans.
- 2013- Latinos twice as likely to be refused a loan as White loan seekers
- Latinos more likely to receive loans at higher prices
- •For many Latinos, home equity is the greatest financial asset they will ever acquire



WHY EDUCATION

- Latinos make up 25% of the public school student population (US schools systems are majority-minority now!)
- Large Attainment gap between Latino and non-Latino white
- Gap between importance placed on edu & engagement in edu among Latinos
- 75% of 25 to 29-year-old Hispanics have at least a high school diploma v. 96% of non-Hispanic Whites
- 15% of Hispanics between the ages of 25 and 29 have bachelor's degrees v. 41% of non-Hispanic Whites (census 2015)



WHY EDUCATION

- Latino enrollment in preschool and kindergarten
- Latinos ages 3-4 trail behind other groups at 37% enrollment, as compared to 48% enrollment of African American children, and 49% of non-Hispanic White children
- More than 80% of Latino children fail to read at a proficient level in 4th grade (Annie E. Casey)
- ~80% Latino children fail to score proficient in math in 8th grade (Annie E. Casey)
- 1^{st} time in 2012, Latino enrollment of 18-24 year olds in college surpassed White students, at 49% and 47% respectively
- less than a third of Latinos graduate from four-year institutions in four years, at 29.8% as compared to 43.3% for White students (National Center for Education Statistics)
- Latino teachers only represent 8% of teachers

(% among Latinos ages 16 to 25)







Figure 1: Highest degree attained among persons 25 years and older by race/ethnicity, 2011






WHY THE ENVIRONMENT

- Prevailing wisdom: a policy concern of those not bound by meeting basic needs
 - BUT: 68% of Latinos say it's an important issue to them, why?
- Half of all U.S. Latinos live in the country's most polluted cities
- Though Latinos only account for about 16% of the labor force, they account for 43% of ground/maintenance and construction workers and up to 75% of agricultural occupations that expose workers to health hazards, bad air quality and economic impacts of extreme weather.
- High exposure to pesticides, industrial strength chemicals (esp. women)


- Latinos are a significant portion of the AZ population and Electorate
