07/25/2021 - 15:15	07/25/2021 - 15:15	Dal Norris	Listening Tour - Round 1	<p>I'm writing to share feedback on last Thursday night's Independent Redistricting Commission Listening Tour stop in Pinal County. I'm a fairly new resident of Arizona, and so I haven't had much exposure to the IRC and its important work. I attended not to offer testimony but rather to learn about and gain insight into the redistricting process. What transpired, though, was a maddening disappointment. The meeting logistics were ill conceived and amateurish in A/V execution. All the socially distanced chairs in the main presentation room were already occupied, so I was shuffled into an overflow room where the attendees numbered at least as many those in the main room and all of whom were seated in close proximity next to each other at conference room tables. The proceeding from the main room was presented on TV monitors in a Zoom-like manner. An understandable A/V approach given the attendee dispersion, but here's where the wheels fell off. Initially the presenter microphone in the main room was inoperable, the delay to resolve suggesting the cause to be more than simply an on/off switch. That got sorted out, but then the audio was barely audible in the overflow room. Visually, the TV screens were a mess. The speaker was not visible in the presenter's window, superfluous windows took up valuable screen real estate, the PowerPoint slides of the IRC presentation were too small to read. The execution suggested the planning decisions for logistical details and A/V set up were based on assumptions rather than on thoughtful discernment and testing done in advance. I was unable to follow the proceedings, and left after 15 minutes with regrets for having made the drive to attend. On my way out the door, I shared my annoyance with a couple of Pinal County employees who informed that the County had offered to support the hearing with their public meeting equipment and experience. They indicated the IRC eschewed this offer and chose instead to rely on the desire of their consultants to manage the meeting logistics. If accurate, the black eye for failed execution is an unintended consequence that accrues to the IRC, not their consultants. I understand the proceedings were recorded, so I may yet be able to gain some knowledge and learning. I offer these comments as constructive criticism, and hope they and similar feedback will prompt the IRC to revisit its processes and methods and ensure a better organization and presentation at the remaining public hearings.</p> <p>Regards,</p> <p>Dal Norris Eloy, AZ</p>

LD28 encompasses communities of interest North Central Phoenix, Sunnyslope, Biltmore, Arcadia, Shea Corridor and Paradise Valley The district has many active neighborhood leaders and organizations with whom I worked closely for over 10 years.</p> <p>Over time, LD28 became a tale of two districts - west and east. The bifurcation between east side and west side related to quality-of-life issues my neighborhood leaders were addressing. For example, on the east side, we battled out of control Short Term Rentals and high-rise, high-density zoning requests. On the west side, we fought crime, blight, homelessness, and poorly regulated drug treatment centers.</p> <p>THE GEOGRAPHICAL DIVIDING LINES FOR THESE DIFFERENCES ARE I-17 AND 19TH AVENUE. MOVING EAST FROM 19TH AVENUE TOWARDS 7TH AVENUE AND 7TH STREET, THE WEST SIDE DISTRICT PROBLEMS BEGAN TO CHANGE TO THE EAST SIDE PROBLEMS. Examples include a City of Phoenix Task Force, named the Violence Impact Project, which is focused on identifying and solving the problems adjacent to the I-17 including crime, prostitution and drug sales. 19th Avenue, a major thoroughfare, includes the Light Rail up to Dunlap and has imported crime to the adjacent neighborhoods, including drugs and gangs. On the other hand, SR51, as it runs through LD28 is flanked primarily by the Phoenix Preserve and prime residential areas. These neighborhoods are a magnet for short term rental companies, buying up residential properties throughout the area, and the area's prime real estate attracts national and international development attention.</p> <p>I ask that you take this bifurcation into consideration when redrawing district lines. I did make a three minute statement and submitted my text to the commentator. However, after carefully listening to all the comments for the entire program, I was concerned that there were some comments suggesting that Sedona and the Verde Valley should stay with Flagstaff. I bring up these additional points for the consideration of the commission.</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Sedona and the Village of Oak Creek (VOC) lie in both Coconino and Yavapai county. However the MAJORITY of our residents are in Yavapai and therefore the majority of our property tax dollars goes to Prescott, not Coconino.</li> <li>2. We have huge infrastructure issues in the Verde Valley, all our small towns are working together on this serious issue along with Yavapai County and our County Commissioners. Flagstaff and Coconino are not involved what happens in the VV.</li> <li>3. Our Yavapai Community College campus is always getting the short end of the funding for our Sedona campus by Prescott, therefore we work with Prescott to fix this, Flagstaff is not involved.</li> <li>4. There is a MAJOR fiber optic line that is coming up I17 to specifically provide internet infrastructure to the VERDE VALLEY, not Flagstaff. This is through a multi-million grant from the feds. Flagstaff is NOT involved.</li> <li>5. Our airport which is part of the national infrastructure is owned and controlled by Prescott, and has ZERO to do with Coconino OR Flagstaff.</li> <li>6. Our jails are on Highway 260 in Camp Verde and in Prescott, NOT Coconino or Flagstaff.</li> <li>7. Our COURTS, superior and others are located on Highway 260 in Camp Verde and in Prescott, not Flagstaff or Coconino.</li> <li>8. Our law enforcement is YAVAPAI County Sheriff, with offices in the Village of Oak Creek, not Coconino or Flagstaff.</li> <li>9. Our regional development in housing and transportation is between the rural Verde Valley towns like Camp Verde, Cottonwood, Cornville etc. Yavapai County and Prescott, not Coconino or Flagstaff are partners in these issues.</li> <li>10. Our water use and planning, which I learned a lot more about yesterday flying 8 members of the Friends of the Verde River conservation group, including several of our Vineyard owners, has NOTHING to do with Flagstaff OR Coconino County.</li> <li>11. The cultural and music programs at the Yavapai College auditorium in Prescott are not available in Flagstaff unless you like college kids Rock concerts.</li> <li>12. Over half of the service companies I use, appliance repair, DISH Network, deck sealing, gate repair etc originate in Prescott, OR in Sedona. NOT in Flagstaff or Coconino.</li> <li>13. The current districting cuts through City limits and County lines. We are in the same town, the same schools, the same churches, the same everything... except districts. In this case, we are not just communities of interest, we are ONE community separated.</p> <p>In prior elections, district 7 has overwhelmingly been represented by one political party. This is not competitive or representative of the diverse population we have. Those candidates do not speak for or care about the issue important to Eastern Arizona because we do not share the same interests or resources. They are focused on what is best for Northern Arizona.</p> <p>We are asking for the same consideration and representation for the issues unique to our communities. Allow Eastern Arizona to be a competitive district again. Allow Eastern Arizona to have a Representative that will speak for our people and our interests again. In 2010, 15 Cities and Towns within Eastern Arizona unanimously adopted a resolution to keep us united (Town of Pinetop-Lakeside Resolution No. 11-1204). These towns included the City of Globe, Town of Miami, Town of Superior, Town of Winkelman, Town of Duncan, Town of Hayden, City of Show Low, Town of Eagar, Town of Springerville, Town of Pinetop-Lakeside, City of Winslow, Town of Snowflake, Town of Camp Verde, City of St. Johns and Town of Pima. We are one united voice asking to be one district. Those in charge of redistricting ignored the resolution last time, going against what was best for our communities. I assume you will have tables attached to each map version that assess degree of compactness, COI integrity, contiguity, and competitiveness - in addition to any VRA requirements. I suppose those tables of data can be ranked somehow to facilitate keeping track of the various maps.</p> <p>Cataloguing map versions as you work on improvements seems an iterative process. The public desires to be able to observe this process fully. Will we have the opportunity to take your posted versions to alter and resubmit? Those who wish to be involved are still trying to understand fully your process for taking input and feedback and incorporating it. Will the next step in map drawing be able to use block and block groups, along with census tracts? We have different issues than urban dwellers: water hauling, forest use, grazing, and state land. I would love to see Apache, Navajo, Gila, Greenlee, Graham and Cochise county be included with Coconino. That way our boundaries would be contiguous and we share common concerns. As far as the Legislative lines it would be would be helpful if they were similar to the Congressional lines, that they took in the southern part of Navajo, southern part of Apache, Graham, Greenlee, Gila and Coconino.
