The Need for Redistricting

- The U.S. Constitution requires regular reapportionment of congressional districts, but states are responsible for creating their own maps.
 - Article I, Section 2
 - “The actual Enumeration shall be made . . . within every subsequent Term of ten Years, in such manner as they shall by Law direct.”
 - Fourteenth Amendment, Section 2:
 - “Representatives shall be apportioned among the several States according to their respective numbers . . .”

History of the Arizona Independent Redistricting Commission

- From 1912 to 2000, Arizona's Legislature controlled redistricting
- Proposition 106 amended the Arizona Constitution to create an independent commission
 - Initiated and passed by voters
 - Prop 106 Ballot Title: "Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of Arizona; . . . Relating to ending the practice of gerrymandering and improving voter and candidate participation in elections by creating an independent commission of balanced appointments to oversee the mapping of fair and competitive Congressional and legislative districts."
- Ariz. Const. art. IV, pt. 2, section 1:
 - "By February 28 of each year that ends in one, an independent redistricting commission shall be established to provide for the redistricting of congressional and state legislative districts."

Commission Membership

- Ariz. Const. art. IV requires:
 - Five members
 - No more than two of the same political party
 - No more than 2 commissioners, of the 4 original members, may reside in the same county

Constitutional Provisions

Ariz. Const. art. IV, pt. 2, section 1(14) provides six constitutional goals for redistricting:

- A. Districts shall comply with the United States Constitution and the United States voting rights act;
- B. Congressional districts shall have equal population to the extent practicable, and state legislative districts shall have equal population to the extent practicable;
- C. Districts shall be geographically compact and contiguous to the extent practicable;
- D. District boundaries shall respect communities of interest to the extent practicable;
- E. To the extent practicable, district lines shall use visible geographic features, city, town and county boundaries, and undivided census tracts;
- F. To the extent practicable, competitive districts should be favored where to do so would create no significant detriment to the other goals.

Projected Timeline

Approximate Dates	Project Phase
July – August	Initial “listening tour.”
August	Census data released and processed.
September	“Grid Map” drawn and adopted.
September – October	Develop possible draft maps and adopt official draft map.
October – November	Minimum 30-day public comment period on draft map.
December – project end	Revise draft map and adopt final plan.

 - Submit comments on near-final map(s)

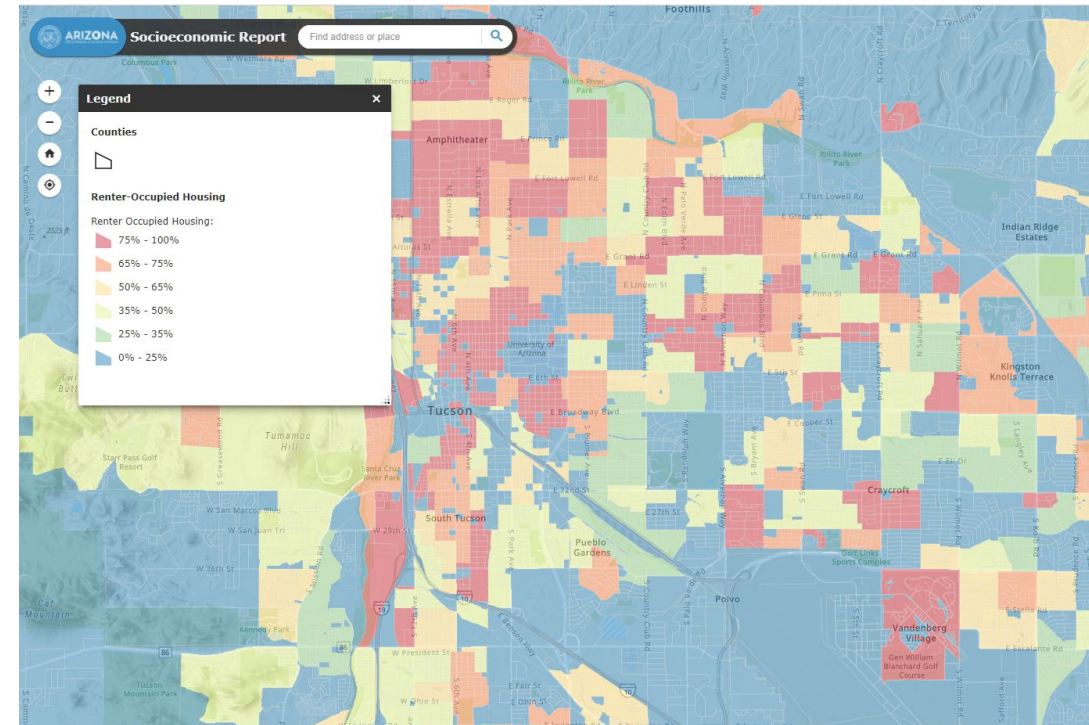
